Dear Parents and Carers,

As we come to the end of term 1, I would like to thank you for all your support. The children have settled well into the school year. Focusing on routines and expectations at the start of the year has resulted in a really calm atmosphere around school. This in turn enables high quality teaching and learning to take place – and what great learning there has been this term!

I have shown many families around our school since September. This is a privilege and, whilst I am always proud of our school and everyone in it, these are times when I feel great pride in who we are as a school. You may have seen our children learning in the village. Year 3 have undertaken some geography fieldwork and Foundation Stage have been on an autumn walk. They have looked at the different natural colours for the season and had a go at matching them.

Year 3 have also been outdoors experiencing what it was like to live in the Stone Age. They most definitely used all their senses on that day – the gutting, and cooking of, fish on an open fire was one of several new experience for many of the children.

The children have been enjoying their time in our teaching kitchen. They love learning new skills and testing them on different recipes. The joy that you see in the kitchen whilst the children are cooking is a sight to behold.

We have a love for reading at our school. Author, Hannah Gold, has visited our KS2 children. It is great to see so many of them now reading her book. We were also delighted to welcome Mrs Bell from the Parish Council to one of our collective worships where the children who entered the reading Challenge over the summer were presented their awards and a goody bag. Outdoor Play and Learning (Opal)

In the weeks after half term our aim is that every child will have wellies and a waterproof and can be outside whatever the weather. It is good for children's mental health, resilience and happiness.

As the school improves play opportunities for your children, we will be asking for help to gather resources but for now we want the children to be able to use our outdoor space whatever the weather.

To help with this we ask that after half term, all children bring a waterproof coat to school every day and if they have a pair of wellies that they can keep in school (named) that they are brought in too. Mr Garfoot, our site manager, has been busy making welly storage.

This is where we are asking that our school community comes together so that every child in school can be outside whatever the weather. This is a new team, with new roles but we are very excited to expand this provision to meet the changing needs of our children and families. We have been very fortunate to appoint the new roles internally, with staff that know our school very well. Please understand that several of us have other roles in school, so please be mindful as we find our feet. It seems a good idea to share a who's who to help you with signposting....

Mrs Charnley- Attendance Pastoral Support Officer. (Mornings)

Completing morning registers. Supporting children with attendance related concerns. Raising awareness of good attendance in school. Providing attendance data for analysis.

Mrs Fitzgerald- Early Help Pastoral Support Officer.

Raising awareness of early help with children, families and staff. Supporting Early Help Assessments and Lead Professional for Team Around the Child.

Mrs Hilliard- Forces & Young Carers Teaching Assistant.

Promoting awareness of Young Carers and Forces within school and with our families. Supporting children through interventions in class. Facilitating Young Carers and Forces drop-in sessions.

Mrs Isherwood- ELSA/Lego Therapy Teaching Assistant.

Delivering targeted interventions on 1:1 basis or in small group sessions to promote the social, emotional and mental health of children.

Miss Sylvester- Pastoral Manager

Co-ordinating the pastoral team. Managing serious caseloads for vulnerable families at Child in Need and Child Protection. Deputy Designated Safeguarding Lead. Children/Adult Mental Health First Aider.



















Attendance

We pride ourselves on high attendance at our school. Our children want to be in school and learning. In line with Lincolnshire County Council, expected attendance levels for all children is between 95-100%. Anything below this is monitored and where necessary letters will be sent, and action taken. If you are worried about your child's attendance please get in touch with Miss Sylvester, our pastoral manager, who can look at what support may be needed.



Arrivals and Punctuality

Children are expected to **arrive at 8.50am** each morning. The gates open at 8.45am. Arriving on time for school is important as late arrivals are disruptive for the class and can be embarrassing for the child who is late. Children can also miss important information during registration including the plan for the day. **Learning starts at 9am and all children are expected to be in class and ready to begin their day by this time.** There is learning for all children from 8.50am. Those 10 minutes are vital as they are an opportunity for teachers and teaching assistants to check in with children, provide 1:1 feedback from yesterday's learning, prepare children for the day's learning, to listen to readers. Lateness is monitored and persistent lateness may result in a Penalty Notice being issued by Lincolnshire County Council.

Holidays and Leave of Absence

Absence will not be authorised during term time except in exceptional circumstances. It is very important that all parents and carers understand that children with unauthorised absences, including holidays, and unexplained absences over a period of 10 sessions (5 days) are at risk of receiving a Penalty Notice from Lincolnshire County Council. Each parent may receive a fine of £80, rising to £160 if you do not pay within 21 days.

From the 2024 to 2025 school year, each parent will only get up to 2 fines for the same child in a 3-year period.

If you get a second fine in 3 years it will be £160. If you do not pay the fine in 28 days you may be taken to court for keeping your child out of school.

If your child is off school 3 or more times within the 3 years you will not be fined but may be taken to court.

Absence through illness

We understand and appreciate that children can become ill and that it is not always easy to decide whether to send them into school or keep them at home, so to help you with this decision we have devised a useful reference guide. If your child is too ill to attend school, please contact the school office or Parentmail before 9.00am with full details of your child's name, class and illness/symptoms. If we do not hear from you, we will ring you to find out why your child is not in school.

Medical Appointments

We request that, where possible, routine medical and dentist appointments are arranged outside school hours as these appointments will affect your child's percentage attendance. We do understand that some appointments, such as hospital consultations, are not always possible to arrange outside of school hours. We do request to see evidence of appointments so please share these with the school office before the appointment. If your appointment time allows your child to come to school for registration and then leave, this will have a positive impact on their attendance figure.



















Operation Encompass

We are an Operation Encompass School, part of a national scheme that runs jointly between all schools and the police.

Operation Encompass is the reporting to schools, prior to the start of the next school day, when a child or young person has experienced, any domestic abuse.

Operation Encompass will ensure that a member of the school's staff (the Designated Safeguarding Lead), is trained to allow them to liaise with the police and to use the information that has been shared, in confidence, while ensuring that the school is able to make provision for possible difficulties experienced by children, or their families, who have recently experienced a domestic abuse incident.

Not only will the books be well used in school it also encourages recycling and is a charitable gesture. It is a heart-warming way to show that the gift of books can be shared with others. As school we hope to develop a love of books and reading for all our pupils. We do not hand out sweets or cakes that have been brought into school for birthdays.



Driving to School

Please be respectful of residents who live close to the school when parking at the beginning and end of the day. Parents and carers are welcome to use the carpark at the village hall and walk the short distance to school to ease congestion. When parked kindly switch off car engines to reduce pollution.

Should I keep my

child off school?



Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics
